The Community and Senior Services Commission of the Town of Los Gatos conducted a Regular Meeting on Tuesday, June 23, 2020, at 5:04 p.m.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

COMMISSIONER REPORTS

Chair Rossman provided information regarding the Town Council adding an additional \$10,000 in Human Services Grants to CASSY, Live Oak Nutrition, West Valley Community Services, and Nextdoor Solutions due to increased demand related to Covid-19.

Chair Rossman discussed the objectives of the Los Gatos-Saratoga Service Providers group and its accomplishments and current state. The Chair explained the critical role the Service Providers have played to respond to Covid-19. Chair Rossman expressed concerns about waning participation and the important role the Commission could perform. Commissioner Blum mentioned having a service providers forum to solicit community volunteers.

Mr. Gibbons encouraged the CHSSC to provide recommendations to the existing General Plan goals and any additions. In addition, Mr. Gibbons communicated that health-related items are sprinkled throughout other elements of the general plan. Chair Rossman suggested that the Commission create subcommittees to develop input to provide to the GPAC. Chair Rossman and Commission Blum formed the GP Public Health review subcommittee. Commissioner Norcia and Commissioner Rahmil formed the GP Senior Services review subcommittee. Commissioner Mathur volunteered to track July 30th GPAC discussions related to social justice and inclusivity as they relate to the other elements.

Type of Service	"Museum Wise" - Art & History Senior Explorer Program 90-minute museum tour and hands-on artmaking or discussion for Los Gatos and surrounding area seniors (65+).
Summarize the program funded by the agency's current grant.	The Art & History Senior Explorer Program is a new program launched in fall 2019. The program offers monthly museum tours and hands-on artmaking to Los Gatos and surrounding area seniors (ages 65+). The purpose of the grant was to provide funding support for this new program developed to offer high quality curated programs to a mature/seniors audience. Inspired by the success of our long-running youth Explorer program, "Museum Wise" was created and led by professional museum staff and included a 30 - 45 minute museum tour and 30-45 minute related hands-on artmaking workshop.

<p>Is the program having its intended impact?</p>	<p>The results are mixed. Our original grant request of \$12,000 would have provided seed funding (staff time and program development expenses) to launch the program, including developing curriculum, conducting outreach to senior communities/care facilities, trialing the program with members of the senior community and fine-tuning the program.</p> <p>With the \$1,000 grant monies awarded to us, the scaled-back plan included outreach - staff time associated with outreach and developing draft program materials - to the Saratoga Retirement Community</p>
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	<p>(SRC) and SASCC (Saratoga Area Senior Coordinating Council). The goal was to invite residents and clients these services to pilot the program.</p> <p>We were able to host two sessions of <i>Museum Wise</i> with two groups of visitors from SRC (assisted living and memory care residents) and by all measures those two sessions were a successful and enjoyable experience for participants and participating caregivers. Unfortunately, due to staffing and administrative changes taking place within its organization SASCC made a decision to put a hold on trialing the program with us.</p> <p>As a result of the Covid SiP mandate, two spring 2020 tours were cancelled.</p>
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<p>What have been the biggest challenges/barriers to fulfilling the objectives of the program?</p>	<p>There were three main challenges / barriers for this program fulfilling the objectives. The first being funding, the museum was only able to raise a total of \$2,900 of the program's total budget of \$24,000, which caused the entire program to be scaled back. The \$2,900 was primarily put towards compiling outreach lists, content development, and hosting two programs. It is also worth noting that due to the budget constraints of many seniors it is vital that this program be offered for free or at a reduced rate which requires that the program's cost be completely underwritten by grants or private donations.</p> <p>The second being outreach, we originally anticipated that we would be able to collaborate with SASCC (Saratoga Area Senior Coordinating Council) which would have brought in more community residents. However, due to staffing and administrative changes taking place within its organization, the partnership was put on hold. Despite this obstacle, we will continue to work with LGS rec to ensure we are serving our Los Gatos constituents.</p> <p>The last challenge is of course, the pandemic and the Shelter in Place mandate. As mentioned above we had two very successful tours with two more on the books for Spring 2020, which was promising as it is the program's first year and the other two barriers mentioned above. However in today's new reality, we are reviewing all of our public-facing programs to determine how and when these programs can and will be offered in new environments. That said, we certainly believe that we can pivot and offer programs like "Museum Wise" for</p>
	<p>seniors, and our k-5 school Explorer program safely and successfully to these important audiences. And we are excitedly moving forward with meeting these challenges.</p>

<p>How are you overcoming those barriers?</p>	<p>In regards to the three challenges mentioned above we are actively working to overcome them.</p> <p>The museum continues to search for new funding sources through grant opportunities and private donations. Currently, our fundraising efforts have been focusing on unrestricted giving, in which funds may be used to support all the museum's programs and operations.</p> <p>In terms of outreach, there is still work to be done to increase our outreach into the Los Gatos senior community. We plan to continue to develop our relationship with the Los Gatos Senior Recreation and senior care facilities to see how we can further collaborate.</p> <p>Lastly, the museum is currently experimenting with adapting our current programming online. We are very excited to be hosting our first online workshop and virtual artist talk series. These programs will pave the way for the adaption of further programs such as "Museum Wise" to the online environment.</p>
<p>Have other funding sources been approached? How have they responded?</p>	<p>Overall, when this program is presented we receive nothing but positive feedback and excitement. We wrote a grant application to the Farrington Historical Foundation for additional grant support which they enthusiastically partially funded in Fall of 2019. We were working with SASCC (Saratoga Area Senior Coordinating Council) to identify further program prospects; however, due to staffing and administration changes this has halted.</p> <p>As mentioned above, due to the impact of the pandemic the museum is actively searching for unrestricted gifts that may be used to support all programs instead of just one specific project.</p>

What are some of the agency's greatest accomplishments during the past year?

The museum has accomplished quite a bit this past. First and foremost **strengthening our relationship with the Town of Los Gatos** to ensure that the museum continues to be a sustainable resource of art, history and culture for all town residents, and effective this July the museum will offer FREE museum admission to all Los Gatos residents.

Another priority has been board building. Recently, the board has **welcomed 2 new Directors and a talented "Community" board member** who takes on the one-year non-voting role to build new community connections.

The Museum just closed **out the fiscal year and met the budget goals**, running a successful annual fund campaign and garnered a lot of community support, significant given the current challenging economic environment. We have an ambitious plan to engage major donor support of our programming and exhibitions lineup.

In March the museum opened the **9 th annual ArtNow exhibition**, which received over 900 artwork entries from 47 high schools, 76 artworks were juried into the show. And even though the museum was

temporarily closed due to the pandemic, we created a stunning virtual _____ tour of the exhibition and showcased the artists in a popular ArtNow _____ Instagram takeover. Additionally, over \$12k in scholarships and _____ awards were given to exhibiting artists. Next year marks the 10th anniversary of the ArtNow program and we're preparing now to celebrate in style!

We have **transformed our lower floor to expand** our hands-on artmaking spaces and community programs, including a large MakerSpace area, an upgraded painting and drawing studio, and a public meeting space that also houses rotating Los Gatos history exhibits. In our newly transformed space we **held our first musical performance** in collaboration with Violins of Hope SF Bay Area.

Finally, the museum has been **awarded a significant grant from Santa Clara County Parks to undertake a 3-year effort to support the Los Gatos History Project**. Through this undertaking, we will catalog and digitally archive NUMU's collection of over 3,000 artifacts; build a dedicated Demo and Prep Lab for the museum's Collection; and collaborate with community historians, conservators, curators, authors and academics to develop and present year-round public programs, presentations, demonstrations, hands-on workshops, and lectures.

<p>What are the key emerging issues for the agency that might impact future grants?</p>	<p>The key emerging issues that the museum faces are funding, visibility, bandwidth and just like many other nonprofits, the impact of the pandemic.</p> <p>The Museum works extremely hard to ensure that all fundraising goals are met. If fundraising goals are not met it heavily impacts the programming that the museum is able to produce and the museum's general operations. Last year, the museum shifted it's business model in order to generate more revenue from earned income programming such as our painting and drawing classes, artmaking workshops, and facility rental program. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic which caused the cancellation and postponement of many of these programs, the museum has to once again temporarily pivot to rely on contributed income to close the gap this upcoming year. As mentioned above, the museum is working on offering online workshops and classes.</p> <p>In addition, the museum has a small team of 6. With this small team the museum is very mindful of how time and energy is spent. Staffers work on programs that not only deliver on the museum's mission but also have the highest return on investment (ROI). The museum calculates the ROI based on adherence to the mission/vision, the amount of community residents served, the monies generated and the inherent community value.</p>
<p>How can the Town help the agency deal with those issues?</p>	<p>The town has helped immensely with recent support in exchange for increased museum services offered to town residents. We are looking forward to continuing to build our partnership. If possible, there are areas where the museum could use further support from the town. Help the museum identify other grants or introduce to potential funders to provide general or program specific support. Help to further increase the museum's visibility in the community.</p>

<p>What services does the agency offer specifically to Los Gatos residents?</p>	<p>EXHIBITIONS NUMU is unique in its collaborative spirit. Our exhibition partners include top curators from the Grammy Museum, Achenbach Foundation, Smithsonian Institute, SETI, California Printmaker's Society, San Jose Museum of Art, ICA, California Historical Society, Los Gatos Art Association, Violins of Hope SF Bay Area, top collectors, San Francisco gallerists and more.</p> <p>ARTNOW The Annual Santa Clara County-Wide High School Art Exhibition and Program, founded in 2012 culminates in an exhibition each</p>
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spring. Students from public, private, and home- schooling high schools are invited to submit their art. A panel of jurors select the work to be shown in the exhibition and also choose the winning pieces of art. Over \$10,000 in awards and scholarships are given out each year to the winners.

LECTURES, CONVERSATIONS & PANELS

We investigate topics and ideas inspired by our exhibitions and our mission. We invite experts, leaders and enthusiasts to lead discussions and share their knowledge and insight.

MUSEUM EXPLORER

Established in 2007, EXPLORER introduces elementary school students to Art and History in a Museum setting. EXPLORER teaches critical analysis skills through fun, creative, and interactive activities. NUMU is certified as a Common-Core provider by the Santa Clara County Office of Education and Silicon Valley Creates. Recently this program has been adapted to serve families on weekends and welcome groups of seniors during weekday mornings.

MAKERSPACE STUDIO

The MakerSpace offers art-making programs and workshops for artists, crafters, and makers of all skill levels and ages that seek to expand knowledge, creativity, community awareness, and ingenuity. MakerSpace programs challenge participants to learn, help spark cultural awareness, and build community connections in a unique museum setting.

PAINTING & DRAWING STUDIO

We offer a range of painting and drawing classes and workshops to youth (13+) and adults of all skill levels, taught by an eclectic mix of area instructors and working artists.

PERMANENT COLLECTION

In support of the museum's mission, NUMU collects works of art and historical artifacts that engage and expand an interest in the globally relevant arts and history of the Bay Area with a special focus on Los Gatos. The collection at NUMU consists of objects, archives, and artwork consistent with the history of Los Gatos and the Bay Area.

<p>Interview Notes</p>	<p>This site visit was done with ZOOM. The museum services K- 12 Students and seniors (65+) in the Los Gatos and surrounding area.</p> <p>They have specific programs directed to these age groups.</p> <p>They work closely with the local artists and the local Art Association in Los Gatos and surrounding areas.</p> <p>The services are provided 7 days a week in different areas of art.</p> <p>Due to the pandemic, the museum has waived all entry fees and they have created virtual programs for all to view online. The museum has strong support from local art lovers and benefactors.</p> <p>The following statistics explain the Museums outreach to the Los Gatos Community and beyond.</p> <p>The Museum Explorer Program (elementary schools, senior tours, and weekend program) served a total of <u>2,405 directly.</u></p> <p>The Museum Explorer K-5 fall/ winter program served approx <u>2,323 students and teachers of this amount 1,318 were Los Gatos residents</u>, the other participants were all from Santa Clara County elementary schools.</p> <p>Due to the impact of the Coronavirus, the 2020 spring sessions were cancelled. Those programs were scheduled to serve an additional 1,700 students and teachers.</p> <p>We outreach to over 500 teachers and administrators in the district The Senior Explorer Program, "Museum Wise" served 60 participants all of which were Saratoga residents.</p> <p>Lastly, the remaining participants in our Family Weekend Explorer Program served 22 children and adults from the area.</p>

At the same time, the town recognizes that there is still work to do reach the goal of *Becoming an Inclusive Community*.

As members of the Los Gatos Commission on Health and Senior Services, we have been very active in the effort to ensure that all the members of our community feel valued, safe, respected, and secure. As a result of that experience, we would like to offer our perspective on the goals, policies, and actions that the town should pursue in order to reach its overarching goal of inclusivity.

Goals, Policies and Actions

Goals:

Los Gatos convenes and supports regional partners to advance racial equity.

Los Gatos meaningfully engages communities of color.

Los Gatos hires, trains and promotes a racially diverse workforce.

Los Gatos creates safe and welcoming services, programs and destinations for all races.

Los Gatos' resource allocation advances racial equity.

Strategy

Focus on eliminating racial disparities in social well-being.

Advance the conversation about race.

Enact institutional changes.

Review resource allocations.

Develop metrics to measure progress.

Implementation

Create success indicators, progress measures and behavior impacts.

Involve a diverse group of Los Gatos staff and community members.

Dedicate sufficient resources for action completion.

Provide a sufficient level of authority to complete action.

PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE PUBLIC HEALTH COMPONENT OF THE DRAFT GENERAL PLAN 2040

References:

1. Local Public Health System Performance Assessment Instrument, Version 2.0, Department of Health and Human Services, Center for Disease Control and Prevention

These three assessment instruments have been used to capture the community health profile of Santa Clara County residents and to identify strategies to address the issues identified by those assessments in order to improve the residents' health and well-being. Ten essential public health services were considered and the six most relevant to Los Gatos are listed here:

1. Monitor health status to identify community health problems
2. Diagnose and investigate health problems and health hazards in the community
3. Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues
4. Mobilize community partnerships to identify and solve health problems
5. Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts
6. Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of health services

In addition, 21 health needs were identified in the county assessment. The needs most relevant to Los Gatos because of their impact on our community include:

1. Behavioral Health (Mental Health, Well-Being, & Substance Abuse)
2. Communicable Diseases
3. Healthcare Access & Delivery
4. Nutrition & Fitness
5. Unintentional Injuries
6. Domestic Violence & Abuse

These services and needs should form the basis for the goals, policies, and strategies that Los Gatos ought to incorporate in the Public Health section of the 2040 General Plan.

The current draft of the General Plan focuses on physical activity and actions that promote active, healthy lifestyles. Most of the services and needs enumerated above are not explicitly addressed in the Plan, except to pass responsibility to local hospitals and residential health care providers. While the Plan seeks to promote health services provided by other agencies, there are only a handful of service providers that address the needs identified above. While acknowledging that Los Gatos cannot play a significant role in addressing all the issues raised by those needs, there are opportunities for it to provide direction and support. Recent examples of such support include awarding additional funding to a handful of agencies whose services are important to residents that are experiencing financial hardship, lack of food access, mental health challenges, and domestic violence. The 2040 General Plan has to recognize the serious public health problems confronting the Los Gatos community. "Retention of the Farmers' Market" as a policy doesn't measure up to the current and future needs of its residents.
